Summer Happenings in My Yard by Mary Ann Hext

Summer is definitely here with hot dry weather and very little rain on our side of the county. I am spending lots of time watering my roses, vegetable garden, and pots; and this past week, I even watered my butterfly garden and lilac bush as they were looking so wilted. We did get 1/2 inch of rain a few nights ago and that has really helped the plants perk up.

In the meantime, I have been enjoying watching the hummingbird activity at my feeders. One feeder is hanging from the deck by the kitchen window so we enjoy watching them come and go while we are eating meals. In April and May, I only saw one or two at a time, but now I have many more; and they are quite active. With the hot muggy weather, I am still only filling them about 1/3 full and replacing every three days if there is any left. Be sure to rinse your feeders 2-3 times with hot water and brush out any mold that is in the bottles. Also clean the feeder part with a brush each time you refill. I recently read this about hummers in *Birds and Blooms*. I didn't realize that when they start migrating south, they don't fly in groups:

"Many kinds of birds, from geese to goldfinches, typically migrate in flocks. But hummingbirds travel as loners—each individual navigates on its own. Even young birds making their first southward migration fly solo, without any guidance from their parents. Instead, they rely on instinct.

Hummingbirds have a rapid metabolism, burning energy quickly, so they frequently stop to feed as

they travel. Any time they come to a good patch of flowers or feeders, they pause and spend some time tanking up. During peak migration periods, food sources may be swarming with hummers zooming around and sparring in midair as they compete for nectar. At such concentration points, they arrive and leave singly, not in flocks. Each individual's journey is a series of relatively short flights punctuated by refueling stops.

While most songbirds and some other kinds of birds migrate mainly at night, hummingbirds travel mostly in the daytime, flying fairly low—taking advantage of the warm sunlight and watching carefully for flowers or feeders along the way."

I also saw a single Monarch caterpillar on common milkweed last week and have been watching him grow. I don't know if he was hatched from a female going north quite late or going south early. I had a few last July also, but larger numbers born in September. I also discovered a bird nest with five blue eggs in it in the cover of our propane tank meter. I haven't seen the parents so will be watching for baby birds in the next week or so.

Even though it is quite hot outside, be sure to take the time to investigate what is happening in your own yards!

TREES OF CHRISTMAS Tree Decoration Needs


- Red, lime green, gold or candy cane striped ornament balls of all sizes


