# Flowers to Attract Hummingbirds summarized from Southern Living

By now most of us have hummingbirds visiting our feeders. They are fun to watch and they are the only birds capable of sustained hovering and can even fly backward and upside down. The ruby-throated hummingbirds is the only species that nests east of the Mississippi but about 17 species live in the U.S. many near the Mexican border.

Here as some flowering plants to add to your garden that will attract hummingbirds if you don't already have these.

- 1. **Salvia** *Salvia officinalis*: This deer-resistant family of flowers is considered one of the best for attracting birds and butterflies. Plant 'Black and Blue' salvia in the middle of the garden or at the back of a border in full sun, where it will grow to 3 or 4 feet tall. Or plant the shorter red salvia in the flower bed or in a pot.
- 2. Trumpet vine Campsis radicans: Sometimes called trumpet creeper, it is a fast-growing perennial vine and a North American native species originating in the southeastern US. It is a hardy perennial and covers sections of fences to hide eyesores. It is wood and bears dark green leaves with trumpet-shaped flowers that are a vibrant coral to orange in color and bloom in clusters. Hummingbirds love it and if you need a start to cover a fence or trellis, let me know.
- 3. Cardinal Flower Lobeliai cardinalis: This self-sowing, native perennial thrives in moist soil and prefers full or partial sun. It offers an excellent source of nectar for hummingbirds from late spring through fall?—in fact, the plant is dependent on them for pollination. Mine gets about three feet tall. For two years, mine died, but last year I found its happy spot and it survived the winter and is thriving.
- 4. **Lantana** *Lantana camara*: This can be planted in the ground or in a hanging backet and comes in many colors and sizes and used in combination plantings. It is a sun-loving plant and hummingbirds are able to track it down wherever you plant it.
- 5. **Petunia** *Petunia*: Hummers migrate at treetop height, where they can easily spot any vibrant blooms below. Grab their attention with a large grouping of pots filled with this vivid, inexpensive annual. Plant them in full sun and deadhead regularly, and your petunias will bloom from late spring until fall.
- 6. **Bee Balm** *Monarda*: Look closely at the flowers of bee balm, and you will notice each petal is a tiny tube perfect for a feeding hummingbird. Plant in a moist, sunny or partly sunny spot, and you're sure to have a healthy flower patch blooming every summer. Most *Monarda* plants are hardy in USDA Zones 4 to 9. Scarlet bee balm is a favorite.
